Cardinal Langley Curriculum Review 2013

We are very proud of the curriculum we offer the students of Cardinal Langley but periodically it is important to review it. In September 2013 we put a plan together with the goal of a more personalised offer for all students to support them in their progression. A significant number of staff generously gave up their free time to ensure the success of the review.

Seeking the opinion of a variety of stakeholders has been at the core of the review's success; teachers, parents, governors and most importantly students were invited to give their opinions on what they thought were the strengths of our curriculum, but also how it could be improved.

The good news is that overwhelming opinion suggests that we are doing things well, but there were some common themes that came through about areas that could be improved:

- The time staff have to deliver courses
- Ensuring that students have appropriate life skills
- The ability of our students to study independently
- The school day
- The number of vocational subjects available at Sixth Form

The next part of the process was to research the different curriculum models that are being used.

We looked at a number of schools in our locality but also investigated further afield including international comparisons.



We brought together the stakeholder voice, research and Government changes on the horizon to form a set of recommendations that required Governor approval in January of this year.

The main changes include:

- An extension of the length of Key Stage 4 (traditionally years 10 and 11 but this will now include year 9) which means students will choose their option subjects at the end of year 8.
- All students to study 3 option subjects at Key Stage 4 as appose to 4. This will provide students more time to study their chosen subjects at a deeper level.

- A tiered entry system to Sixth Form to ensure students select appropriate courses.
- An increase in the number of vocational courses offered in Sixth Form and an extension of our enrichment programme e.g. free driving theory lessons

We hope the changes contribute to ensuring all our students achieve outstanding results (we will be keeping a close eye on this) but more importantly that they are happy in school and develop into the outstanding people we know they are capable of becoming.

If you were to ask any Headteacher, "Why does your school exist?" you would expect the answer to talk about bettering the prospects of the students, equipping them with the skills required to make a contribution to society and in our case as a Lasallian Catholic School to help them walk in the footsteps of Our Lord Jesus Christ.

They would probably go onto say that central to achieving these goals was a dedicated and talented teaching force. While all of this is true, it is also true that none of it would be achievable without the support and dedication of the "Teams behind the Scenes." At Cardinal Langley there are several teams which support the education of our young people and in this and future editions of Cardinal Langley's Voice, we will be featuring the work of these teams. Every visitor's first contact upon arrival at Cardinal Langley is with the administration team in the front

office. This group of six ladies form the hub of the schools administration. On a daily basis they greet visitors and direct them to their appointments, ensure the hundreds of daily messages are channelled in the right direction and where necessary provide a sympathetic ear for our young people when they are feeling out of sorts. Without these public faces of Cardinal Langley parents would not receive reports on the progress of their children, key information relating to important matters such as entitlement to free school meals would not get processed.

In addition to the six ladies in the main office there are two other groups in the "back rooms" who carry out key roles in the running of the school. The finance team make sure all the bills are paid on time and orders for equipment are processed so our students get the resources they require to progress in their education. The final piece of the jigsaw is the reprographics centre which ensures that all the resources required to stimulate and reinforce learning are produced.

Friday 14th of March was CAFOD Family Fast Day. CAFOD stands for Catholic Agency for Overseas Development.

It works in over 60 countries worldwide and is part of the international Caritas network. The Kintbury team are inspirational: the group of volunteers consists of young people with a range of life experiences and ambitions, connected in their passion for the retreat. The impact that they have on our young people is fantastic; helping them to realise just how wonderful they are. Many of our pupils have expressed that they enjoyed the Kintbury experience so much, that they would love to follow in their footsteps and become volunteers themselves.


