Let us hear, as if addressed to each one of us, the words that you spoke to the Samaritan woman: "If you knew the gift of God!"

You are the visible face of the invisible Father,

of the God who manifests his power above all by forgiveness and mercy: let the Church be your visible face in the world, its Lord risen and glorified.

You willed that your ministers would also be clothed in weakness in order that they may feel compassion for those in ignorance and error: let everyone who approaches them feel sought after, loved, and forgiven by God.

To begin the Extraordinary Jubilee Year of Mercy, pupils of Cardinal Langley attended a Reconciliation Service on Friday 11th December where they reflected on the story of The Prodigal Son and its relevance to their own lives and wrongdoings. When inviting us to take up the challenge, Pope Francis explained that "the Holy Door will become a Door of Mercy through which anyone who enters will experience the love of God who consoles, pardons, and instils hope". In keeping with the theme of 'The Door of Mercy', pupils walked over footprints with words such as 'Mercy', 'Reflect' and 'Repent' printed on to remind them of the purpose of this sacrament when entering the school chapel at the start of the service. As part of the reflection on the story of The Prodigal Son pupils were shown images and reflected on the lyrics to Elbow's 'Open Arms' song, reminding them that the opportunity to repent and return to God's favour as well as reconciliation with those whom we've offended is an open door.

Computing & ICT

Welcome to the Computing & ICT department at Cardinal Langley. Our Department is certainly thriving as over the last few years the numbers opting for IT & Computing has risen considerably. This is through the success of our KS3 curriculum and results at GCSE and A level. We are a successful department achieving ALPS 1 or 2 in our Level 3 vocational courses in ICT and Multimedia.

We strive to ensure every student in our classes succeed and fulfil their full potential. Many students move on to University to study an ICT based course and, most recently, game design courses with the introduction of Multimedia. The department comprises five teaching staff; Mrs Borrill (Subject Leader), Mr Gallagher (Assistant Subject Leader), Mr Gumbley (Teacher of ICT/Computing and Subject Leader for Learning for Life), Mrs Hamid (Teacher of Computing & ICT), Mr Mundy (Teacher of Maths & Computing) with the support of Mrs Gorman (Learning Support Assistant). We work together as a team to provide a warm, welcoming, enthusiastic environment where students display a thirst for knowledge and learning.

In addition to preparing our students for their public examinations, we take great pride in the range of extracurricular activities on offer to the students. These range from trips to Jaguar Land Rover in Liverpool to explore how IT is used in business to taking KS3 students to Barclays Bank to explore the use of computing. We offer an after school coding club enabling KS3 students to explore the use of various technologies such as the Raspberry Pi, Lego robot and in the next few weeks the new Microbit which is being given to every Year 7 student.



Every Tuesday evening we offer GCSE computing revision sessions for Year 10 and 11 to enable students to consolidate learning and gain any additional support they need. Each evening a member of the team is available to support students through their learning journey, this ranges from homework help, coursework catch up or GCSE and A level revision, the sessions are tailored to the student's needs. Our goal is to provide the best possible outcomes for all of our students.

BBC micro:bit is coming to Cardinal Langley

micro:bit

The BBC has unveiled the BBC micro:bit, a pocket-sized codeable computer with motion detection, a built-in compass and Bluetooth technology, which is to be given free to every child in Year 7 across the UK.

The micro:bit is the BBC's most ambitious education initiative in 30 years, with an ambition to inspire digital creativity and develop a new generation of tech pioneers. The UK currently faces a

critical skills shortage in the technology sector and the BBC and partners aim to help change that. It aims to inspire young people to get creative with digital and develop core skills in computing, science, technology and engineering. The micro:bit will also be made commercially available later in 2015, so those not in the Year 7 group can get involved.

Coding in seconds

"We happily give children paint brushes when they're young, with no experience - it should be exactly the same with technology," Sinead Rocks, Head of BBC Learning said. "The BBC micro:bit is all about young people learning to express themselves digitally, and it's their device to own. "It's our most ambitious education initiative for 30



years. And as the micro:bit is able to connect to everything from mobile phones to plant pots and Raspberry Pis, this could be for the internet-of-things what the BBC Micro was to the British gaming industry." The BBC micro:bit will start to arrive in schools in late January, giving children a chance to settle into the new school term,

Study Skills Workshop



Year 11 students recently benefitted from an intensive Study Skills workshop delivered by presenters from Learning Performance. Having been split into two venues the students were shown a number of useful revision strategies and given guidance on which particular methods suit their individual learning styles. At the conclusion of the presentation they were then given the opportunity of applying their newly developed skills to actual GCSE revision topics and materials. All students responded positively to the session and unanimously agreed that both the presentation and the ideas would be very useful in the coming months.

What do you do in Anime club?

The main goal for Anime club over this year and maybe next year too, is to create a manga of our own. It will be inspired by many different Animes, including Attack on Titan, Naruto, Hetalia and many more, including several Studio Ghibli Films. Thanks to the exceptional drawing talent of the people in anime club and

and teachers the opportunity to build it in to lesson plans for the rest of the academic year. It measures 4cm by 5cm, is available in a range of colours, and designed to be fun and easy to use. It can

be coded with something simple in seconds – like lighting up its LEDs or displaying a pattern – with no prior knowledge of computing. It also connects to other devices, sensors, kits and objects, and is a companion to Arduino, Galileo, Kano, littleBits and Raspberry Pi, acting as a spring board to more complex learning.

Each element is completely programmable via easy-to-use software on a dedicated website (www.microbit.co.uk) that can be accessed from a PC, tablet or mobile. A personal area on the website allows users to save and test creations in a simulator

before they are transferred to the micro:bit, and the available tools scale to be as complex as ideas, imagination and skills require.

The micro:bit will be built into lessons by the computing department

and resources will be provided for students to learn the basics. The computing department are also running after school coding clubs every Tuesday and Thursday. For more information please see your computer science teacher, Mrs Borrill or Mr Gallagher.




An Introduction to the 5 W's

Five fold model of a Christian community is applicable to all Catholic Schools and Colleges. It provides a framework for understanding, evaluating and celebrating the distinctive and authentic living tradition of Catholic Education within the Diocese of Salford. Furthermore it clarifies and reasserts the particular role of schools and colleges in the Church's overall evangelising and pastoral mission, something which is timely in our current circumstances within the Church and within society as a whole.

Welcome 'Come'

- We strive for inclusion the diversity of students and staff is celebrated and this promotes mutual respect, builds self esteem, and builds a sense of community keeping in mind the kingdom of God.
- The values, policies and processes we share are inherent in the pastoral care of our students and staff and provide clear evidence of the quality of the school's welcome to everyone.



Word 'talk'

- All students receive their entitlement to be spiritually, morally, socially and culturally educated across the entire curriculum and lived experience of the school community;
- Celebrating the Word of God in worship and liturgy.

Witness 'work'

- Recognising that God is with us in every aspect of school life.
- Adults who see and express their roles in school as co-creators with God and as part of the redemptive activity of Christ in all aspects of school life.

Cardinal Langley update

The Ethos leaders are witnesses in action! These are a group of 40 students from all year groups who are involved in all aspects of the spiritual life of our school community and are currently preparing for Advent through fundraising and putting together the Advent services.

Accelerated Reader Scheme

September saw the introduction of our new, choosing. Each book also has a guiz attached Year 7, reading scheme Accelerated Reader. The key focus of the scheme is to promote independent reading for pleasure. We achieve this by offering young people support with their reading. Each child has now been tested to identify their independent reading level. Every book in the library has a colour coded level and every child has been given their own coloured coded pathway. Through accessing books from their identified pathway, we are confident that each child is reading at a level that allows them to understand and enjoy the books they are

so that we can track the level of understanding to ensure the students are on the correct pathway.

The aim of the scheme is to progress each student to a level that would allow them to independently read and understand the text on a GCSE paper. During this first term, we have identified a cohort of students who would benefit from additional reading time to achieve this goal.

During the remaining two terms, this cohort will be invited to attend sessions in our daily 'Reading Cafe'. In the reading cafe we will focus on helping students with the following

To read accurately, fluently and with understanding. To understand and respond to the text they read. To read, analyse and evaluate a wide range of text (within their reading pathway).

Each session will be led by a librarian with the support of 3 of our 6th formers, who have received training on the scheme. Refreshments will be provided.

Communicating with Parents/Carers


In addition to recent changes to the school website, we have invested in eSystems to enhance communication with parents and carers.

The two main systems for direct parent/ carer communication are SIMS In-Touch & SIMS Learning Gateway (SLG). These allow more efficient delivery of information, whether it is for querying student absence, sending general information (electronic letters), or for delivering students' school reports which we now provide up to 6 times in the year, depending on the

students' year groups.

Queries regarding student absence

are sent using the SIMS In-Touch system. Parents will receive either a text or a voice message asking for the reason for a student's absence. Parents/carers can respond through this system and the information is sent



Student 'data-only' reports are emailed to parents/carers using SIMS In-Touch. These reports are also uploaded to the Sims Learning Gateway (SLG) where they can be read once logged in.

The annual student 'text' reports which contain both the performance and target data for each subject are currently only



are very excited by this programme; however, the scheme only works if the students are reading regularly. Students are encouraged to read for at least an hour a week at home and this forms part of their

uploaded to the SLG (from where they can be read). These cannot yet be emailed using In-Touch. In both cases, the reports contain a live *link* which allows parents/carers to give feedback on the school reports. The feedback link is to a response form on our website.

The SLG allows you to see both/all students where parents/carers have more than one student in the school. It is not necessary to have additional logins. The SLG also allows you to

> advise the school of any changes to key details such as phone numbers and email addresses. This is crucial because all communication is controlled using the contact details we hold for you in the system. When you advise contact detail changes. these are viewed by our Admin staff prior to implementation and queried

directly with you if necessary.

Why is it so complex to login or request new passwords?

Both In-Touch and the SIMS Learning Gateway are secure communication services which meet the Data Protection Requirements as defined by the Information Commissioner's Office.

Your username has to be unique, and is controlled through the service we

obtain from Capita (who 'host' the SLG). When you request an update, we have to process this through their host service - which takes at least 24 hours to be requested checked and issued. We then have to send this safely to you.

Difficulty in accessing the SIMS Learning Gateway.

Some parents/carers have had difficulty in accessing the SLG service. There are a number of

homework. Parents/Carers can help to support their child by talking to them about what they have read and by signing their reading log (page 9, journal), to confirm that the homework has been completed.

possible reasons for this, however it is often difficult for us to understand each individual circumstance.

Earlier problems surrounded the issue of passwords expiring after 180 days and passwords not meeting complexity requirements. These are security features as defined within ICO guidelines. You can define 'secret information', and request your new password directly from the Capita SLG login page as long as you have saved this initially.


Girls Football.

The Year 10 A team are into the fourth round of this year's English Schools Cup


