

Easter Blessings




and a record number of 166 applications to join the Sixth Form.

Extension Work for Everyone!



Our new-build extension is now taking shape ahead of the increased Year 7 entry from September 2016, to meet a growing demand for our school. In addition to housing five new classrooms, there will be a social and catering area to ease congestion at lunchtimes.

It is sited at the rear of the school behind the Sixth-Form centre and gymnasium.

Meanwhile... for those who can't wait - see the model.

As part of his AS coursework Owen Cassidy (Y12) has made an architectural model of the new building that is in the process of construction here at Cardinal Langley. He interpreted the architect's drawings to manufacture the 1:50 accurate scale model out of a range of materials: MDF, Plywood, foam core board, styrofoam and acrylic and used the laser cutter and hand skills to assemble the final piece. It was a difficult task and as construction drawings are very detailed, Owen had to work through them, problem solving as he went along.

Owen's attention to detail and eye for precision has resulted in him producing an excellent model which has been admired by the

architect who designed the building himself and the construction site manager, who helped him interpret the drawings. The model will be put on display once the new building is complete.

Cardinal Langley has recently signed up to be a tootoot school in an effort to combat all forms of bullying.

The initiative, which is also supported by Northern actor Will Mellor, will provide young people with an online platform to securely and anonymously report any incidents directly to key staff in the school. Having measures in place to prevent all forms of bullying, and a clear process for reporting incidents, is incredibly



important for the safety of all children. **tootoot** is an effective tool to help in these situations and, by giving students access to this platform, we hope that the common barriers often encountered when reporting such incidents can be overcome.

tootoot is available 24/7, 365 days a year and is six times more effective than face-to-face reporting. It will be used to support the already effective school systems by raising awareness of safeguarding issues and improving the overall learning environment for young people. The platform and app, developed with the support of Barclay's, will also help to promote equality, support diversity and increase confidence in school pupils.

tootoot developer Michael Brennan, said: "Modern bullying comes in many different shapes and sizes. But whatever its form, it is a subject that is often very difficult to talk about if you become a victim. That's why I developed **tootoot** and by rolling it out to interested schools it will give a huge number of young people the confidence to report what is happening to them."

Witness [work]


– We look at our School mission statement and work together as a witness community.

On Wednesday 2nd March we held a soup lunch where students and staff make a donation to Caritas and have soup and a bread roll instead of their lunch. This is kindly donated by P&A Catering and is a very successful fundraising initiative, raising around £150 each time we run the soup lunch.

Caritas: St Joseph's Penny

The 'St Joseph's Penny Appeal' has long been a tradition in Catholic schools across the Diocese of Salford where students raise money for children and families in need. The Appeal is now in its 112th year.

The St Joseph's Penny Collection was started by the Catholic Children's Rescue Society, which has recently been renamed Caritas.

Caritas means "charity" and "love" in Latin.

Caritas works with children and adults in need across the Diocese of Salford helping people who are:

- Homeless
- Hungry
- Lonely
- Having difficulty with friends or family
- Struggling at school
- Experiencing financial hardship.


During Lent all staff and students at Cardinal Langley took part in a number of fundraising activities: a soup lunch, cake sale, Easter egg raffle. We are hoping to raise £2000 and will report our full total in the summer term.



The Diocese of Salford is hiring a double-decker bus with priests on board to reach out to people during the Year of Mercy. Having begun in February, the "Mercy Bus" is touring parts of Greater Manchester and Lancashire, stopping in town centres, housing estates, colleges and homeless centres. The group of priests on board will be available for confession, a blessing or simply a chat.

The idea behind the venture is to respond to the Year of Mercy, announced by Pope Francis. It's an innovative way of taking the Church to the people. Music will be played as the bus tours the streets. Also on board will be young volunteers, who will distribute leaflets to passers-by. Bishop John Arnold said, "The Mercy Bus is a way of reaching out to people who might not otherwise have contact with the Church. We are going to them, rather than expecting them to come to us."

The Mercy Bus is coming to Cardinal Langley RC High School on Thursday 7th July 2016.




Skiing and More


Can you solve the conundrum?

Statistics show that missing 8.5 days (17 sessions) of school in any school year can reduce the success level of a pupil by **1 GCSE grade**.
