

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# Race for the Line - Success at National STEM Competition

From designing and racing their foam-powered rocket car within school, three Year 7 pupils went on to represent Cardinal Langley at the Manchester regional finals. Despite losing a wheel as their car crossed the finish line, the team won the regional heats which led to them participating in the national finals of the STEM 'Race for the Line' competition at RAF Wittering. As the finals approached, the team worked hard on overcoming their 'wheel issue'; they used their knowledge of forces and aerodynamics to create tri-spoke carbon fibre wheels (supplied by Solvay, a local manufacturing company) and eventually settled on a design they could build within an hour. On the 28th June, with time constraints and strict specifications to adhere to, the team successfully built their 33g car within the one hour build time and placed 2nd out of 17,000 national entries!





Along the way, they met HRH the Countess of Wessex, RAF Wittering staff and enjoyed observing and handling military equipment. A huge congratulations to the boys, and thank you to everyone who helped along the way, including Mr Hogg, Mr Mundy and Mrs Hamid.









### What is STEM?

STEM subjects (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) offer the chance to learn lifelong skills that are in high demand from employers such as the Military, production companies and engineering projects. There is currently a national shortage of students studying STEM subjects which will result in a labour shortfall by 2023. So, if you are the next budding STEM car designer/racer, the competition begins again next year for all Year 7 students.

### **Diocesan Certificate Achievement**





### Attendance is Key...

### Research shows:

- 80% of students with attendance above 98% achieve 5 good GCSEs.
- 70% of students with attendance above 95% achieve 5 good GCSEs.
- Only around 25% of students with attendance below 90% achieve 5 good GCSEs.

The link between attendance and academic progress is clear. Everyone feels unwell from time to time but the key is resilience - attend school and participate in lessons even if you're not feeling 100%.

95% might be a great result on a test, but with attendance, it is simply average. 30% of students with 95% attendance do not achieve 5 good GCSEs.
