## Wonderful Woodwork


We are very proud of our brilliant Year 10 designers.

to tackle next, we know will be done with style and grace.


Our Year 10s have performed admirably throughout the year and will hopefully raise the bar again entering Year 11.

#### **Ready for Work?**



A few weeks ago, Year 10 students had mock interviews where they created a CV and an application for a job. The students were to apply for a job in a new hospital that was being built. These roles ranged from electricians and nurses to doctors and builders. There was something for everyone no matter what field they would pursue. I thought this was a great experience for everybody as it would help to reduce the stress of interviews in the future. It was quite a pleasant experience despite my worrying, and the interviewers were extremely kind and patient with everybody. The mock interviews calmed my nerves a lot as I was anxious for my sixth form interviews that I would be taking next year but this assured me that my fretting was unnecessary.

The mock interviews were set up in the hall evenly spaced apart. The interviewer would take our CV and application and read over them. We would then ask questions both about the job that we were applying for, how we believed it would suit us and the achievements on our CVs. Sometimes, after a question we will be given tips on how to answer it better in the future. Usually, the mock interviews lasted for about 15 to 20 minutes for each person but on occasion they ran over. After we had completed the interview, we were given back feedback sheets that marked us on our communication, confidence, preparation and overall, how likely you are to get the job.

The work will soon be displayed in school where everyone can learn about the Holocaust and marvel at the work Year 9 produced. This was an excellent display of independent learning and making a wonderful contribution to the wider community.

It is a pop musical based on the award-winning book by suffragette descendant Kate Pankhurst. The heroine, Jade breaks away from her class to take a peek behind the scenes of the Gallery of Greatness. Along her journey, she meets incredible wonder women, such as, Rosa Parks, Marie Curie, Emmeline Pankhurst, Frida Kahlo and Amelia Earhart.

It fitted perfectly with a section of the A Level study on second and third wave feminism. Miss Anderson and Mrs Turner had a wonderful time accompanying the Year 13 History group, and they hope the students who attended enjoyed their evening.



## A Field Trip to the Peak District

At the end of June the Humanities Faculty took our Year 7 students to the Peak District National Park. Arriving by coach in the village of Castleton, the students took part in a day of activities to help them understand the history and geography of the area.

Students completed work based on Peveril Castle which was completed in 1080AD and overlooks the village from a high point. Applying their knowledge of castles from their History lessons in school they tried to identify what type of castle it is. They also visited the museum to look at how village life has changed over time for its resident. One of the most dramatic changes that can be observed in the village is the impact of the swathes of tourists that visit each year. To assess these impacts, students conducted a traffic count and environmental survey, before assessing the function of different shops around the village.

It is hoped that the students now have a greater appreciation of what a National Park is, why it is important to protect areas of natural beauty like the Peak District and the reasons that people are drawn to them so much.

It's fair to say that a great time was had by all, despite the unreliable weather, and the gift shop and café doubled their expected profits for a weekday in the middle of school term through the sales of hedgehog soft toys and ice cream (most of which could still be found around the mouths of many students when they stepped off the coach back at school! Well done Year 7 for a great trip.



#### **Braving the Elements**

#### **School Meals**

The cost of a standard school meal will increase from 1<sup>st</sup> September 2022. Many children in the UK are entitled to free school meals but often parents are not aware that they are eligible or they choose not to claim their entitlement. We would like to encourage parents and carers to apply for free school meals for their child for two reasons:

- Your child can select a good-quality and healthy lunch each school day using the school's cashless catering system.
- The school can claim a Pupil Premium for every child receiving their free school meal entitlement. This additional funding helps to provide a wider range of opportunities and learning experiences for your child.
