Well done to our amazing performers and roll on next year!


















Rest in Peace Mr MacCarron

John also was Director of Sixth Form studies in his final years at Cardinal Langley. He loved his time at Cardinal Langley and missed the interaction with the students.

John was diagnosed with Parkinson's disease when he was 50 but he didn't let that get him down and became a Councillor for Stockport. In

John's health deteriorated and sadly John passed away on the 13th March 2023.


Below, you can read some of the students' thoughts about the day:






Meeting Tom Rogers

Term-Time Absence

Changes to regulations came about in September 2013.

Headteachers may only authorise term-time leave in exceptional circumstances and are no longer permitted to authorise leave of absence for family holidays, including family celebrations that involve an extended stay or an extension to a school holiday period, or other recreational activities during term-time. Please bear this in mind when planning your 2023-24 holidays and family events. Unauthorised leave is recorded and may result in the issue of a fixed penalty notice.
